glass

- ✓ Beer bottles.
- ✓ Wine bottles.
- ✓ Cool drink bottles.
- ✓ Food jars such as tomato sauce, jam & mayonnaise bottles.
- ✓ Drinking glasses.
- ✓ Glass containers

- ✗ Ceramic cups, plates & pottery.
- ✗ Clay garden pots.
- ✗ Laboratory glass.
- ✗ Crystal & opaque drinking glasses.
- ✗ Mirrors, windshields & window glass.
- ✗ Heat resistant ovenware.
- ✗ Light bulbs, TV screens & monitors.



plastic

- ✓ Plastic beverage bottles and personal care product containers.
- ✓ Fabric softener bottles.
- ✓ Plastic bags.
- ✓ Take away containers.
- ✓ Ice cream containers.
- ✓ Cling wrap.
- ✓ Plastic numbered #1 to #7 including yoghurt and margarine tubs

- ✗ TETRAPAK - Fruit juice and milk containers look like they are made out of paper, but they are lined with aluminum foil and plastic.
- ✗ Multi-laminated plastic foils such as bacon wrappers.
- ✗ Polystyrene food trays.
- ✗ Wax or plastic-coated packaging for liquids e.g. milk and yoghurt cartons.



paper

- ✓ White office paper.
- ✓ Magazines, books and wrapping paper (nothing laminated).
- ✓ Newspaper.
- ✓ Cardboard boxes (plain and corrugated).
- ✓ Cereal boxes.
- ✓ Till slips.
- ✓ Cigarette boxes.
- ✓ Windowless envelopes.

- ✗ Cardboard boxes with polystyrene inside.
- ✗ Polystyrene paper cups, plates and food trays.
- ✗ Blueprint or carbon paper.
- ✗ Cigarette ends.
- ✗ Used tissues, diapers and paper towels.
- ✗ Wet or dirty paper.
- ✗ Self-adhesive paper, post-it notes and stickers.
- ✗ Cement bags and dog food bags.
- ✗ Laminated or waxy paper.



tin

- ✓ Beer cans.
- ✓ Cool drink cans.
- ✓ Metal lids of glass jars.
- ✓ Food tins.
- ✓ Old pots and pans.
- ✓ Aerosol cans

- ✗ Packaging with a foil base e.g. sweet and chip wrappers.
